Housekeeping Extinct?



Since the pandemic hotels have made health and safety a top priority, keeping public spaces clean and taking additional measures like providing hand sanitiser and masks to minimise the spread of C-19. However, now it seems that housekeeping might become a thing of the past for the exact same reason. According to The New York Times, a lot of mid-level hotels are now only offering daily housekeeping services on request, otherwise guests are expected to clean their own rooms, especially for short stays. This could mean the loss of many housekeeping jobs though, which according to a 2021 report by Unite Here would cost about USD5 billion in annual lost wages. The newspaper says some hotels have opted for a tier approach, such as Marriott, who reportedly said that the tier system would offer a higher level of service to those who paid more.
