

What is food service ware? Disposable take-out containers and some packaging – including bowls, boxes, cartons, cups, plates, platters, trays, hinged containers, lidded containers, egg cartons and film wrap – used to hold food and drinks.

What you need to know

As of July 15, 2024 businesses can no longer distribute or sell single-use (disposable) food service ware in B.C. made with certain hard-to-recycle plastics including polystyrene foam (e.g. Styrofoam[™]), or use them to package food or drinks.



What you need to do

All businesses need to:

1. Stop selling food service ware made with Class B materials

Don't sell or distribute disposable food service ware made completely or partly from biodegradable plastic, oxo-degradable plastic, PVC, PVDC or polystyrene foam. Products made of compostable plastic are still permitted.

2. Stop selling food and drink that's packaged in Class B materials

Don't sell packaged foods – like instant noodles in a cup or eggs in a carton – in bowls, cartons, wraps or other packaging made completely or partly from biodegradable plastic, oxo-degradable plastic, PVC, PVDC or polystyrene foam. Products made of compostable plastic are still permitted.

Food service providers also need to:

3. Stop using take-out and delivery containers made with Class A prohibited materials

Don't pack to-go orders (or any other foods or drinks you prepare for immediate consumption) in disposable containers made completely or partly from compostable plastic, biodegradable plastic, oxo-degradable plastic, PVC, PVDC or polystyrene foam.

Through the Single-Use and Plastic Waste Prevention Regulation, B.C. is phasing out many hard-to-recycle single-use plastic items – reducing waste, protecting our environment, and creating a cleaner future for all British Columbians.

EXEMPTIONS



Polyvinyl chloride (PVC) film wrap – **exempt until** July 1, 2028



Polystyrene foam trays for fresh or frozen raw meat, poultry, seafood or fish (but not sushi) – **exempt until July 1, 2030**



Paper and plantfibre take-out and delivery containers, including those lined with compostable plastic or other allowable plastic



Food service ware meant for sale or distribution outside of B.C.



Food and drinks meant for sale or distribution outside of B.C.
